Psalm 66

Remember Shout for joy to God, all the earth; sing the glory of his name; give to him glorious praise! Say to God, "How awesome are your deeds! So great is your power that your enemies come cringing to you. All the earth worships you and sings praises to you; they sing praises to your name." Selah Come and see what God has done: he is awesome in his deeds toward the children of man. He turned the sea into dry land; they passed through the river on foot. There did we rejoice in him, who rules by his might forever, whose eyes keep watch on the nationslet not the rebellious exalt themselves. Selah Bless our God, O peoples; let the sound of his praise be heard, who has kept our soul among the living and has not let our feet slip. For you, O God, have tested us; you have tried us as silver is tried. You brought us into the net; you laid a crushing burden on our backs; you let men ride over our heads; we went through fire and through water; yet you have brought us out to a place of abundance. I will come into your house with burnt offerings; I will perform my vows to you, that which my lips uttered and my mouth promised when I was in trouble. I will offer to you burnt offerings of fattened animals,

with the smoke of the sacrifice of rams; I will make an offering of bulls and goats. Selah Come and hear, all you who fear God, and I will tell what he has done for my soul. I cried to him with my mouth, and high praise was on my tongue. If I had cherished iniquity in my heart, the Lord would not have listened. But truly God has listened; he has attended to the voice of my prayer. Blessed be God. because he has not rejected my prayer or removed his steadfast love from me!

This Thanksgiving—no matter what's going on in your world—pause and remember. Remember who God is and what He has done. In His goodness and wisdom and sovereignty, He leads us into the fire (v. 10-12), through the testing (v. 12), and brings us out to a place of abundance (v. 12). You may find yourself in any one of those three stages today. But wherever you are, take joy that our God hears, tends to, and loves us (v. 18-19). And then go tell. Testify to what He has done for your soul!



Treasuring God In Our Traditions by Noel Piper

Treasuring God in Our Traditions presents the importance of passing along Christ-centered traditions and a Biblesaturated legacy in Christ to future generations; how the "everyday" routines of life and the "especially" celebrations of holidays and dates can be practically passed down to future generations. When parents and grandparents seek to pass along the treasure of God to their children and grandchildren, they will develop and deepen their love for Him.

The Littlest Watchman: Watching and Waiting for the Very First Christmas by Scott James
